PROCEEDINGS

THE ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Indiana State Bar Association was called to order at 2:15 o'clock in the Assembly Room, Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, Indiana, President Carl M. Gray, presiding.

The sections on Property and Taxation, Insurance, Criminal Law, and Utilities reported that they had held section meetings, conducted programs and elected officers.

RESOLUTION ON PROPOSED RULE 71-A

MR. COLEMAN: Some time since, the Department of Justice undertook to secure the passage of legislation to speed up condemnation proceedings, and in that legislation they sought to be enabled to make parties defendant only those persons who happened to be known without provision for search of the records, affidavits and the like. They were unsuccessful in obtaining that legislation, and are now seeking the rule of the Supreme Court to be known as Rule 71-A which in substance accomplishes what the legislation would have accomplished if passed.

Different members of the bar interested in titles have been canvassed with respect to it, and this morning the Real Property Section adopted a resolution which I now offer as a resolution of this meeting.

RESOLVED, that it is the sense of this body that proposed Rule 71-A would be detrimental to the interests of owners and lien holders of real estate and should not be adopted by the Supreme Court, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Supreme Court and a copy be furnished to the American Bar Association.

The motion to adopt the resolution was seconded, put to vote and was carried.

PRESIDENT GRAY: Mr. Newkirk, do you have your resolution?

MR. NEWKIRK: Your committee submits the following new By-Law:

XXV—SECTIONS

- 1. For the purpose of advancing the objectives of this Association and to enable more members to actively participate in the meetings of this Association, the Board of Managers is hereby authorized to sponsor and to approve the organization of such Sections as it considers advisable and is hereby further empowered to discontinue any Section so approved and to combine any such approved Section, excepting the Judicial Section hereinafter referred to, with any other section.
- 2. Each Section when so organized and approved shall have the power to adopt its own By-Laws not inconsistent with the Articles and By-Laws of this Association but no By-Laws of any Section or any amendment thereof shall become effective until submitted to and approved by the Board of Managers.
- 3. The By-Laws of each Section shall provide for the election by the enrolled members of such Section of a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary and a Council which Council shall consist of the aforesaid officers and such additional members as may be prescribed by the By-Laws of such Section.
- 4. Each Section shall be entitled to such assignment of time and place for its part of the program of each meeting of this Association as may be allotted to it by the Board of Managers and shall incur no obligation in excess of the amount previously appropriated to such Section by said Board.
- 5. The Chairman of each Section shall prepare and submit a written report to the Secretary of this Association at least fifteen days before each regular meeting of this Association, which report shall summarize the work of such Section and conclude with the Section's recommendations, if any. No action, report, resolution or recommendation of any Section shall be binding upon this Association or be considered a part of or included in the proceedings of any meeting of this Association; provided, however, that the Board of Managers may transmit to this Association for its consideration any recommendation or resolution of any Section which said Board deems advisable and said Board may cause the whole or any part of the reports to be printed and circulated among the members of this Association.

6. Except for a Judicial Section which has been organized to include the Judges of the State of Indiana, there shall be no qualification for membership in any Section other than membership in this Association and enrollment in such Section.

Your Committee recommends, first, the Amendment of the Association's By-Laws by adding thereto a new section to be numbered XXV being the one submitted as a part of this report, and, second, the discontinuance of this Committee.

Mr. Newkirk moved the adoption of the By-Law, the motion was seconded, put to a vote, and carried.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JUDICIAL SELECTION AND TENURE

MR. BOMBERGER: The committee proposes the following amendment: That Sec. 13 of Article 2 of Indiana Constitution be amended to read:

Sec. 13. All elections by the General Assembly, or by either branch thereof, shall be viva voca; and all elections by the people shall be by ballot; provided that all ballots for the election of judicial officers, other than city judges and justices of the peace, shall be paper tickets separate from all other ballots and shall be without anything thereon to indicate any party, political or other affiliation of any judicial candidate, or group of judicial candidates; provided further, that all candidates for judicial office excepting only those for city judge and justice of the peace, shall be originated from among members of the bench and bar in a manner to be prescribed by law, but such manner shall be other than by political parties.

After an extended discussion, Mr. Bomberger offered the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that the report of the Committee on Judicial Selection and Tenure be referred to the membership at large by referendum ballot to be taken by mail under the direction of the Board of Managers, and that the Board of Managers shall commit the Association through its legisla-

tive committee or otherwise, as deemed appropriate, to the result of that referendum; that the committee be authorized to make the necessary clarification or consolidation or condensation of this amendment.

The resolution was moved, seconded and carried.

RESOLUTION ON SUMMERS-McCARREN BILL

MR. HACKER: Mr. President, I offer this resolution. Be it

RESOLVED: By the Indiana State Bar Association That we approve the Summers-McCarren Bill for the regulation of Administrative Procedure now pending before Congress, and that we strongly urge its careful consideration and enactment. Be it further

RESOLVED: that a certified copy of this resolution be forwarded the Indiana members of the Senate and House of Representatives.

I move the adoption of the resolution.

The motion was seconded, put to a vote, and carried.

REPORT OF MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

MR. HUGUENARD: During the past year there have been admitted to membership 115 lawyers and there have been dropped from membership 111. Twenty-mine have died.

Submitted herewith is a study concerning the Indiana Bar which is self-explanatory. It appears that only 27% of the lawyers in the First District and 31% of those in the Eighth District belong to the State Bar Association; that 75% of the lawyers in the Ninth District and 56% of those in the Fifth District belong to the State Bar Association. Approximately 40% of all lawyers in the state are members. It seems reasonable to believe that with concerted effort during the coming year at least 50% of the Indiana lawyers will assume membership in the Association.

The figures on the Bar in relation to population may be of some value to lawyers returning from military service. Indiana has one lawyer for approximately every 850 people. The First, Third, Fourth and Sixth Districts would appear to have an average number of lawyers. The Second, Fifth, Seventli Eighth, Ninth and Tenth Districts have fewer lawyers than the state as a whole. The Eleventh District has one lawyer

for every 400 people. In this connection it would be extremely helpful if the Gross Income Tax Division would release figures showing county by county the average income of the legal profession.

I take it in all likelihood this table will be rubhished so there is no need to burden you with figures that may be dull and uninteresting at this time.
